Bottom line: We're Short on Supply

- Water supply needs increase with population
- CA is short over 6 million acre-feet (af)
- 1 af = supply for one single home
- Water supply reliability moving target with climate change



Sacramento Story: Drivers for Water Utilities

- Over appropriation on American River
- Water Forum Agreement in 2000 (www.waterforum.org)
- Groundwater overdraft concern
- Discovery of contamination
- RWA created as Joint Powers Authority





Sacramento Story: NEW Drivers for Water Utilities

- Three dry years in a row
- State mandated regulations
- New Legislation
- Governor's executive order to reduce consumption 20% by 2020

Cresthaven Neighbors Show Off Their "Blue Thumb" Sixteen Cresthaven neighbors participated in a unique pilot project designed to help residents create beautiful, water-efficient landscapes.

Over the past several months, participants in the "Blue Thumb" Neighbor Program enjoyed at-home consultations on efficient watering and landscape design, as well as educational workshops on sustainable landscape design, efficient irrigation and selecting beautiful, low-fuss plants.

Participants came away inspired and are beginning to make changes that both beautify their landscape and use less water. For example:

- Larry Bergeron replaced defective sprinkler heads and developed a landscape plan that reduces lawn and incorporates a flagstone path.
- Jack Wallace plans to remove some grass in the front yard for less water, fertilizer and mowing.



 Brad Findlay created a landscape plan for his back yard that includes a new seating area and drought-

> tolerant plants. He also inspected his sprinklers to ensure all are working and in good condition.

The "Blue Thumb" pilot project was provided free of charge by the Regional Water Authority and city of Roseville in partnership with the Cresthaven Neighborhood Association.

Objectives for Pilot homes

- Reduce landscape water use by 20%
- Create behavior change lasting 1 year
- Motivate residents to do 2 key behaviors

Reduce each irrigation cycle by 2 minutes (five stations, watering three times weekly)	Save 80 gallons per day
Plant low-water use trees and plants	
Water your yard early in the morning or later at night	Save 25 gallons each time you water
Add 2-3 inches of mulch around trees and plants to reduce evaporation	
Quickly repair leaks and broken sprinkler heads	Save 20 gallons per day per leak
Install a water-efficient drip irrigation system for your trees, shrubs and flowers	Save 15 gallons each time you water

Definitions:

- Water Efficient Neighbons: Average water use of nearby homes with similar square footage and lot size that are considered to be highly efficient
- All Neighbors: Average water use of nearby homes with similar square faotage and lot size



Water Efficiency Tips

Is it Time for a Tune Up?

Remember to evaluate and adjust sprinkler heads and nozzles every month during the watering season to keep your irrigation system running efficiently.

- Spray and Rotor Nozzles: Check for clogging or blow outs; re-adjust the arc or radius if needed; and replace broken nozzles with the identical manufacturer and size.
- Drip Systems: Make sure the filter is clean; look for missing drippers, chewed or punctured tubing; and check for tube connections that may have blown apart.

Water Efficiency Tips

Did you know that turning off the faucet is like turning off a light? According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, a faucet running for five minutes uses about as much energy as a 60-watt light bulb running for 14 hours.

When temperatures reach their peak this summer, remember these easy tips for saving both water and energy:

- Delay all outdoor water use, including landscape irrigation, until early morning or late at night.
- Add 2-3 inches of organic mulch (e.g., leaves, wood chips) to shrub and plant areas.
- Use a broom instead of water to clean sidewalks, driveways or patios.
- Use an automatic shutoff nozzle on your hose.
